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President's message



As we near the end of the year, I reflect upon the various activities that have occurred throughout 2018.

The ACFP has been a leader in the Opioid Response Initiative, a collaboration with the Alberta Medical Association and Alberta Health Services which included a grant from Alberta Health to fund an

emergency response to the opioid crisis. With this funding, we are enabling Primary Care Networks across the province to improve capacity for providing opioid agonist therapy, providing education to providers and looking at ways to improve service delivery. It is a made in Alberta solution to a complex problem impacting many across the province and the country.

We hosted successful events including the earliest sell-out of our Annual Scientific Assembly (with an exciting rebranding announcement to Family Medicine Summit – March 1-3, 2019) and over 600 attendees in person and by webcast for our Practical Evidence for Informed Practice conference. Our First Five Years

in Practice committee hosted their first event in June with a well received practice management session focusing on tax tips.

After hitting #200 toward the end of 2017, the continued dedication of the hard-working PEER team has continued to provide high quality Tools for Practice summaries to assist with making informed decisions in our practices.

Our leadership registry, engageprimarycare.ca has continued to assist in placing primary care representation into settings across the province to ensure the voice of Family Medicine is heard in decisions impacting our health care system.

Our Board, committees and ACFP staff have continued to work hard to provide educational initiatives and advocate for primary care across the province. I thank them all for their ongoing dedication.

It has been a busy and successful year. I look forward to further accomplishments in the year ahead.

Under the ACFP's Bylaws, this is a governing board, meeting six times per year to fulfill their role of strategic governance responsibility. The responsibility of management and operational delivery on this strategy is passed on to the Executive Director, Terri Potter. The responsibilities of our Board include ensuring that the ACFP is properly managed, its property and assets are suitably cared for, and high-quality services are provided to all its members

The ACFP President is also the Board Chair and official spokesperson on issues that arise during and between Board meetings; nonetheless, decisions are made collaboratively by the whole Board. The ACFP Board remains connected, informed, and involved in the provincial health care system and primary care initiatives through various ongoing formal and informal relationships including its active contributions in the Alberta Primary Care Alliance (PCA) that meets to confer and collaborate regarding provincial primary care delivery decisions and directions.



Board Governance Committees

Two committees have been designated by the Board to support its governance functions—Governance Advisory and Finance and Audit.

Governance Advisory Committee

A standing committee of the ACFP Board, the Governance Advisory Committee (GAC) is responsible for the annual recruitment of potential Board members, according to Board-stated needs, along with annual review and provision of recommendations for changes to organizational bylaws and updates to Board policies. This committee must have at least two members from the Board of Directors with the Chair being the Past President, past Board member, or designate from the Board.

The Alberta College of Family Physicians (ACFP) Annual Scientific Assembly (ASA) now Family Medicine Summit (Summit) Planning Committee is responsible for the development and delivery of the ACFP's official annual conference and Meeting of Members (AMM).

Practical Evidence for Informed Practice Committee:

The PEIP Conference Planning Committee is a standing committee which plays an integral role in the creation and delivery of an evidence-based, clinically relevant, and thought-provoking CPD event on an annual basis.

Membership Advisory Committee

The Membership Advisory Committee (MAC) serves to ensure the ACFP is meeting the needs of its diverse membership. The committee's role includes being responsive to emergent member needs and, where necessary, creates sub-committees or task forces to identify and meet these needs. The First Five Years in Family Practice (FFYFP) Committee supports family physicians in their first five years of practice and family medicine resident transition into practice. The committee acts as a resource to the ACFP for those in the early stages of their career.


Now in its fourth year, the ACFP's FFYFP Committee continues to make progress with



its outreach activities and accomplish the goals they set out to achieve. Highlights in 2018 include:

- Three articles for members: Financial Freedom for the (Young) Family Physician, Navigating the World of Insurance, and From Resident to Doctor: Time Management Tips to Help Keep You Sane
- Development and presentation of two sessions at the 63nd Annual Scientific Assembly (ASA): Billing Smarter Not Harder and Transition Into Practice, and hosting a luncheon mixer
- Presentation of information sessions about the FFYFP Committee to firstand second-year residents at the Universities of Alberta and Calgary,
- Additional presentations of the Transitioning from Residency to Practice session at FREZER, Rural Resident's Academic Day, and Transition to Practice events at both the Universities of Alberta and Calgary.
- Planning, development, and execution
 of an evening CME and networking
 session entitled "Tax Tips for your
 Practice." This session was offered
 through webcasting in addition to inperson and was a great success.


Awards and Recognition Committee



Membership Growth

As the provincial Chapter of the CFPC, the ACFP is a professional voluntary organization that represents over 5,060 family physicians, family medicine residents, and medical students in Alberta. Membership continues to increase steadily and rose by 4% by the end of 2018.

Throughout 2018 we reached out to all new Chapter members (active and family medicine residents).

The initial letter is accompanied by a package featuring the Who's Who in Health Care document and highlights what ACFP offers to its members:

- Supporting members and their needs through CPD,
- Supporting medical students, family medicine residents, and family physicians in their first five years of practice,
- Bringing the voice of family physicians to the table with external stakeholders,
- Raising awareness of the value of family physicians,
- · Providing a source of best practice resources, and
- Striving for leadership in CPD, curriculum development, experiential learning opportunities, and ongoing research that inspires excellence in family medicine.

Medical Students

The Alberta College of Family Physicians (ACFP) continued its outreach initiatives in 2018 targeting Alberta's medical students. Each year the ACFP allocates funds with the provision of increasing awareness among medical students and serves as an opportunity to encourage family medicine as a first-choice specialty through skills acquisition and professional networking.

Promoting Family Medicine to Alberta medical students begin at the time of acceptance where we offer incoming medical students the ability to shadow a rural or urban family physician in a variety of work settings through our Shadowing Program. In 2018, with the partnership of the AMA's Sections of General Practice and Rural Medicine, we were able to give 65 students the opportunity of taking part in the Shadowing Program. We continue our presence by sponsoring and attending each of the University of Alberta and the University of Calgary's medical school orientation. We look forward to the opportunity to welcome medical students and introduce the college.

In 2018, through various learning opportunities, the ACFP collaborated with and supported medical students at the University of Alberta's Information Session, Clinical Skills Workshops, and last year's Alberta Medical Students Conference and Retreat (AMSCAR).

Many of our initiatives were made possible through the countless member volunteers who generously volunteered their time.

Dr G. Michael Allan (Mike) is the Director of Program and Practice Support in the College of Family Physicians of Canada and Professor in the Department of Family Medicine at University of Alberta. He has been in practice 20 years, given over 300 invited presentations and published over 100 articles. He contributes to a regular evidence-based update (called Tools for Practice) distributed to more than 32,000 clinicians and published in the journal "Canadian Family Physician." He also co-presents a weekly medical podcast (on iTunes) called Best Science Medicine podcast.

ACFP Conferences

The Alberta College of Family Physicians hosted its 63rd Annual Scientific Assembly (ASA) on March 2-4, 2018 at the Rimrock Resort Hotel in Banff, Alberta.

Attendance

The conference reached a record-breaking sell-out of 387 family physicians, family medicine residents, medical students, and research participants. Together with speakers, attendance reached 412 on site participants.

In addition to the sell-out, the 63rd ASA also recorded its fastest sell-out to date. The ACFP acknowledges and thanks the 63rd ASA Planning Committee for its insight in determining participant needs and program development for Alberta family physicians in primary care.

Program

The 63rd ASA Group Learning program was certified for up to a maximum of 15 Mainpro+ credits. Presented by 49 speakers, the breakdown of the 38 sessions are as follows:

- 6 Keynotes
- 21 Workshops

Research Poster Presentations & ASA Welcome Reception



The What's Up Doc? Oral Presentations and the Research Poster Presentations and ASA Welcome Reception were very well attended and recognized the top achievements in family medicine and primary care research. More than 58 submissions were submitted to the ACFP's Call for Research, with 19 oral and 26 posters approved for presentation.

Is There an App for That?

Why, yes. ACFP implemented new technology for the ASA including an intuitive, registration system and check in, and an event app. The event app was widely used with a 95% adoption rate.





Networking and Social Opportunities

Saturday Family Movie Night

Family Movie Night continues to attract registrants and their families on Saturday evening. Held in the Hawthorn rooms, the film shown is based upon the most votes cast throughout the ASA.

Sponsorship

The Sponsorship Program for the 63d ASA was another sell-out, with the participation of 23 sponsors.

For 2018 the program was adjusted to incorporate more non-profit participation using an invitational approach beginning with non-profit organizations, then for-profit companies where physicians are primary consumers, and then by health care/pharmaceuticals/industry) companies.



At the 63rd Annual Scientific Assembly, the ACFP launched a new name for their annual conference – The Family Medicine Summit (The Sumnit)!

Practical Evidence for Informed Practice (PEIP) Conference

The seventh annual PEIP conference continued its tradition of being a "can't miss" CPD opportunity for ACFP/CFPC members and their allied health care colleagues from across the country. The conference format—a day and a half of short plenary sessions followed by a rapid-fire question and answer period—continues to receive positive feedback from attendees.

For the second year in a row, the conference offered a live-streaming webcast option for out-of-province colleagues and those who could not travel. In-person attendees exceeded 375, and the webcast component saw a marked increase in attendees to 260 virtual attendees (including 16 clinics). In total, PEIP 2018 was delivered to more than 660 primary care providers across the country.

Also featured in 2018 were two pre-conference sessions on opioids: OATs Aren't Just for Breakfast, and a Collaborative Mentorship Network Information Session. Both sessions were certified and attracted 60 registrants each.

CPD Outreach Programs

The ACFP hosts a variety of additional CPD programs each year. These outreach opportunities are housed within our Evidence and CPD Program, and through our other Chapter partnerships.

Practising Wisely Program



Practising Wisely focuses on developing the skills of primary care providers, particularly family physicians, to "practice wisely" by navigating through relevant online resources that support their own understanding of available evidence, enabling them to participate in informed, shared decision-making with their patients.

Developed by the Ontario Chapter, this program uses case studies that reflect real life scenarios.

The program was recertified in 2018 for both the two- and three-credits-per-hour. In the second year of ACFP overseeing the circulation of the program in Alberta, the program continues to sell-out. Five workshops were held in 2018 with ninety-eight percent of attendees rating the program as relevant to their practice.

Evidence and CPD Program



Proudly sponsored by the ACFP, the Evidence and CPD Program is run in partnership with the University of Alberta's PEER (formerly Evidence Based Medicine) team, with additional in-kind support from


the University's Centre for Life Long Learning via the provision of additional team members as required for delivery and execution.

Best Practice Support Visits (Academic Detailing)

This program is similar to Family Medicine Rounds and saw the participation of \sim 700 physicians from seven PCNs province-wide over the 2017-18 season. The teaching sessions are developed by the PEER team and delivered to a small group of pharmacists from participating PCNs who then hold sessions in their local PCNs to disseminate content and teachings to local physicians. Sessions are presented in 30 minute blocks and are both didactic and interactive.

This program is certified as a two-credit-per-hour program by the PEER team who has taken over the administration and delivery of the program since the 2017-2018 season, which has seen the addition of two PCNs, bringing the total to seven province-wide.

CPD and Practice Supports Online



Tools for Practice Articles

The Tools for Practice articles are distributed to more than 35,000 family physicians and allied health care providers across Canada and internationally and the Tools for Practice webpage continues to account for approximately 10% of the overall traffic to the ACFP website.



GoMainpro

GoMainpro, the ACFP's online learning platform added several new product enhancements including a fresh new user interface and several video libraries from the Practice Evidence for Informed Practice conference and the Annual Scientific Assembly. The learning platform saw a steady increase of subscribers and has more than doubled its numbers.

The Leadership Registry

Engage Primary Care

Officially launched in 2016, the EngagePrimaryCare.com portal has created a registry of over 250 physician leaders willing to take on some sort of leadership role to advance the principles of the Patient's Medical Home.

By utilizing the registry, the ACFP and its partners are facilitating more involvement of family physicians in system-wide decision-making, as well as allowing more family physicians to accept leadership opportunities within their areas of interest. We have successfully matched more than 40 physicians since the site's launch with a variety of initiatives fulfilling requests and developing partnerships with Alberta Health Services Strategic Clinical Networks, Alberta Health Services Programs (eReferral, Netcare, Enhanced Recovery, Clinical Knowledge and Content Management Services), AMA's Toward Optimized Practice, Choosing Wisely Alberta, and the CFPC.

The goal of the Engage Primary Care portal is to provide a one-stop-shop for physician engagement and the development of a support process for physicians engaged in leadership activities. With the help of our partners, we don't just engage physicians, we create ongoing relationships.

Certification and the CERT+ platform

On January 1, 2018, the National Standard for Support of Accredited CPD Activities came into effect in Canada. These standards were developed to safeguard the integrity of accredited CPD activities from the influence of sponsoring organizations that could lead to bias.

Adherence to the National Standard is mandatory for the approval of all certified CPD activities included within the Canadian national/provincial CME/CPD accreditation systems for physicians. All activities seeking certification from the College for Mainpro+ credits must be developed in compliance with the National standard.

The ACFP provided support throughout 2018 to CPD Providers as they adjust their internal processes and policies related to the development of certified CPD activities being held in Alberta.

Certifying CPD Opportunities for Family Physicians

The ACFP has an important role in certifying provincial programs seeking one-credit-per-hour certification. Applications are received by our office through the CFPC's CERT+ online platform which allows for all supporting documentation to be uploaded at the time of application.

Program applications received by the ACFP are screened by ACFP staff trained in Mainpro+ certification requirements to ensure the application can continue to the review stage. Any deficiencies found within the application submission are identified and staff work with providers to ensure these deficiencies can be appropriately addressed prior to the application moving forward to a reviewer.

CFPC trained reviewers in Alberta ensure the topic is relevant to family medicine and the content presented is scientifically valid. They also ensure the processes identified by the scientific planning committee in the development of the program content meet CFPC certification standards and criteria. Programs successful in meeting the quality criteria are approved for certification by the ACFP.

In 2018, the ACFP received and processed 69 program applications and 231 individual session reviews. While program applications in 2018 remained on trend with 2017, the ACFP experienced a decline in session reviews. This decline was anticipated as many session reviews are related to programs for which providers have found it necessary to adjust their policies to ensure compliance with the National Standard for Support of Accredited CPD Activities.





10th National CPD Accreditation Conference

An Alberta NCCPD committee member, and several ACFP staff attended and participated in the 10th National CPD Accreditation Conference in Mississauga in the fall of 2018. This conference is co-hosted by the College of Family Physicians of Canada and the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, and provides information on policies that will support future CPD development, including innovative learning opportunities and initiatives. The conference provides an invaluable opportunity for ACFP representatives to network with other accredited provider organizations across Canada.

Research

Supporting Family Medicine and Primary Care Research in Alberta

We continued to support our family medicine research community by providing the opportunity to build capacity in research through our Research Showcase held during our annual conference in Banff.

In 2018, a total of 45 research abstracts were selected for oral presentation/poster display at the Research Showcase highlighting just a few of the many research questions generated in community-based practice. Program evaluations on projects relevant to primary care were also featured.

Awards were presented during the evening reception to the top three research projects in both the oral and display categories. Recipients of the awards were determined through a peer-review process, and evaluated on: relevance and importance to family medicine; relevance to primary care research and researchers; Innovation/originality; clear, well-written description, well-defined objectives and appropriate learning methods/style.

The ACFP remains an active member of the Alberta Primary Care Alliance (PCA) which brings together the experience and expertise of physician partners who are involved in the advancement and improvement of primary care for all patients, families, and communities in Alberta.

Members of the PCA bring together multiple perspectives, resources and mandates to facilitate ways to collectively address and improve primary health care province-wide and to advocate and support their constituents in that improvement. Building on existing member organizations' strategic directions, the Alliance's goal is to foster a coordinated and aligned approach to meet the needs of patients, caregivers, families, primary care teams, PCNs, and the healthcare system not only today but into the future.

Its mission is to serve as a family physician forum for strategic discussion and establishment of shared goals and collaborative action for the advancement of the Patient's Medical Home in Alberta.

The PCA's vision is every Albertan having access to a home in the health care system that includes their own family physician and a team of providers, ensuring they are provided timely, comprehensive, and continuity of care.

To that end, the PCA upholds:

- The shaping, development, and launch of the Primary Health Care Integration Network,
- The building and continuous support of a Physician Leader Network,
- Collaborating on the Primary Health Care Opioid Response Initiative.
- Informing the technological developments that support the PMH, continuity, and collaborative care, and
- Meeting with delegations to bring the primary care perspectives to external projects and initiatives.

Primary Health Care Opioid Response Initiative

Tackling the opioid crisis in Alberta will require new approaches and an immediate response of the entire health system to change its trajectory. The engagement and response of primary care physicians, their teams and Primary Care Networks (PCNs) in Alberta will be essential in defining new primary health care approaches to address the crisis and the systemic issues contributing to the crisis.

The Primary Health Care Opioid Response Initiative (PHC ORI) is a multi-stakeholder project funded by the Alberta Health Minister's Opioid Emergency Response Commission (MOERC) through a grant agreement with the Alberta College of Family Physicians (ACFP). The ACFP, Alberta Medical Association (AMA) and Alberta Health Services (AHS) and Primary Care Networks (PCNs) worked together to lead this essential work to focus the primary care response that will continue through March 2020.

The project supports activities aimed at addressing the opioid crisis, including:

- Urgent Opioid Response addressing the urgent needs of those in crisis through the provision of Opioid Agonist Therapy (OAT) and distribution of naloxone kits within primary care settings.
- Enhanced Provider Decision Support, Knowledge Translation and Education - ensuring basic knowledge and competencies to support patients with addiction, mental health and pain issues, and changing current practice within primary care clinics and PCNs to better care for individuals using opioids.
- Enhanced Opioid Related Service Delivery through Zone
 PCN Committee Engagement, Planning and Implementation
 developing new integrated care models coordinated with
 partners including AHS addiction and mental health services
 and community services.

Results of the PHC ORI will be evaluated and will result in an interim evaluation in March of 2019 and final report at the completion of the project in 2020.

















Alberta Seniors Care Coalition

In 2017 the College of Licensed Practical Nurses of Alberta (CLPNA) took over the ACFP's position as secretariat, assuming the Committee Chair's responsibilities of the Alberta Seniors Care Coalition (ASCC).

With priorities of multidisciplinary integration in all clinical work and capacity building in primary health care, the ASCC continues its work with partners and networks involved in senior's health care in Alberta.

The Committee meets quarterly, sharing with each other the work being done by each individual organization with regards to seniors care and identifying where we can work together.



Collaboration for Change Initiative

The ACFP remains an active member of the Alberta Collaboration for Change Initiative (CCI). This coalition is committed to improving primary care through dialogue, mutual exploration, and citizen-centred action.

Guided by the vision of the Patient's Medical Home, Collaboration for Change brings together a group of provider organizations with distinct practice perspectives and aims to enable patient engagement by focusing on the patient's journey of care.
